2014: Resolving for a Healthier Pet

Each January, we start a new year by promising to become better versions of ourselves; we will eat a healthier diet, lose those extra few pounds, stop smoking, or give up some other deliciously naughty habit that we treasure. Most of the time, we find the draw of the old habit ultimately dwarfs our resolve, and we revert to the prior, less perfect version of ourselves. One proven way to keep a resolution is to join a partner in developing the new habit. Guess what, pet owners? You have a fitness, wellness, self-improvement partner sleeping on your couch!

If you are a dog owner, and you have a fairly healthy dog, please consider your dog's potential as an exercise partner. Even small dogs can walk a fair distance. You can begin with very short walks and increase them weekly. If your dog is very small, you can buy a used baby stroller and push the dog in the stroller. There are commercially available strollers for dogs and cats, so even cat owners can have their pet's company while they exercise. The benefits of good, long walks are twofold: first your pet will become thinner and increasingly fit. The surprise benefit, though, will be the improvements in both temperament and bonding.

There are also several sports one can enjoy with dogs, many of

which are available locally. There are several businesses and clubs in our area which offer instruction in the sports of agility, dock diving, tracking, and many other sports. These sports give the dog physical and mental exercise; some offer the owner exercise as well.

Most of us also seek to improve our eating habits, and that is another arena in which our dogs and cats can join us. The vast majority of American dogs and cats are "big boned," "chubby," "fluffy"... you get the idea! A twenty-pound dog needs about 370 calories of food a day; for most brands of food, that is roughly one cup. Perhaps I should be more clear. The cup to which I refer is the kind we use when measuring flour; not the kind from which we drink our Super Ultra Giant Gulp. If your pet is overweight, meaning he or she does not taper in at the waist; meaning you cannot easily feel some ribs; then you need to reduce the food to slightly less than the daily requirement in order to drop weight.

If cleaning up your diet makes your New Year's Resolution list, bring your pet along for the ride. Reduce the treats. Buy nutritious, high-quality foods. Feed your dog or cat only what he or she requires to be fit

Another self improvement goal that you can share with your pet is

improved dental care. As you strive to floss, water pick, gum massage or whatever 12-step program your dentist has outlined to keep your teeth bright, white and strong, consider brushing





your dog or cat's teeth once a day. I can already hear you: "Oreo hates when I brush his teeth." Turns out, he doesn't. He hates when you pry his mouth open. Get the right equipment: a soft-bristled toothbrush for your dog, or a kitty toothbrush for your cat, as well as an enzymatic toothpaste. (We don't use Fluoride toothpaste in our pets; they will not spit. They can have their fluoride treatments during dental procedures when we can swab it out safely). I, personally, do not care for the finger brushes. They don't have bristles all the way around, and they spin when you use them. Pull your pet's lips back so you can actually see the back teeth. Then gently rub the teeth with the toothpaste and toothbrush. They will naturally lick and chew because you have put something in their mouth. Distinguish that from dislike.

Maybe 2014 is the year you commit to your appearance. Apply

the wrinkle creams, manage the hair, spruce up the look for 2014. Share that commitment with your pet. Plan regular grooming

appointments so the hair does not get matted and the toenails gets regularly trimmed. Many times, when an owner brings me a pet, it is because the groomer, while picking through the hair, nails, or ears, came upon something that seemed abnormal. It is great to have a fresh set of eyes looking closely at your pet every now and then.

The most important resolution, I saved for last. We should all strive for

2014 to be more diligent in following the directions on medications: ours and our pet's. Give the Heartworm medications the same day you pay your mortgage or on the first of the month. Attach it to a day you can easily remember. If you or your pet have been prescribed antibiotics, finish the course. Taking a partial course of antibiotics is a very good way to get dangerous resistant bacteria. If your pet takes arthritis medications, get the recommended blood test every 6 months. Following directions on medications and monitoring drug levels and effects are among the safest ways to stay well.

It is inevitable that we will make promises to ourselves that we do not keep. However, we can only be more and do better when we strive to do so. Let's all prepare to make 2014 a safe, better, healthier year for both our four- and our

two-legged families.

So many of us make resolutions for ourselves, but what about for our pets? Especially for those of you that got a new furry family member for the holidays.. what was the breed? Oh yeah, cute. But even if they are not new to the family, they still deserve care and maintenance.

When it comes to cats, long-haired need regular brushing to keep the undercoat from binding up at the base of the fur, causing painful matting. You can also buy deshedding tools for short- and long-haired breeds to assist in less shedding, and they learn to love the rub down.


Dogs, on the other hand, have many different coat types and needs when it comes to grooming. The shorter the coat, the lower the maintenance. You can utilize a rubber curry brush though to minimize shedding.

Then you have you double-coated medium length dogs like Shepherds. These take more consistent brushing, as they lose their entire undercoat twice yearly; and they should not be bathed

more than 4-6 times a year. Too frequent bathing can cause skin irritations and conditions. There are also longhaired, double-coated shedding breeds like Retrievers and Shelties. These dogs need to be brushed and combed, reducing shedding and matting. There are also breeds that do not shed, such as curly Poodles, drop-coated Shih Tzus, and fine-haired Yorkie types. These dogs need weekly brushing, at a minimum, if kept more than a half inch long, and they need to be seen by a groomer every 4-8 weeks. These breeds have human-like hair and can be bathed as much as weekly, as long as they are brushed after they

Don't be discouraged, I know it sounds like a lot of work, but we spend hours each week grooming ourselves, and I am suggesting an hour every two weeks for your pets. You probably spend more time than that watching TV commercials in a week! And the perk, your pets will smell much better when snuggling!

Cat Naps... or how a cat sleeps!

Cats are among the world's best sleepers. They slumber away about 60 percent of their lives... up to 16 hours out of every 24. This schedule means that a nine-year-old cat has been awake for only about three years of its life!

A typical feline day includes over 15 hours of sleeping and dozing and four to six hours of grooming and playing, with the rest of the day devoted to hunting, eating, and exploring.

There are three types of adult feline sleep... the short nap, the longer light sleep, and the deep sleep.

Periods of light sleep and deep sleep alternate. When kitty settles down for more than a brief "catnap," the phase of light sleep lasts for about half an hour. He then experiences deep sleep for six to seven minutes. During deep sleep, the cat's body relaxes, and he appears to be dreaming (twitching and quivering). In humans, this phase is referred to as REM sleep (rapid eye movement). After the deep sleep, the adult cat then returns to another bout of 30 minutes of light sleep until he eventually wakes up.

A napping cat is on "radar

patrol," scanning the environment for any small sound. His very keen senses keep him alert to any changes in the environment when he is in light sleep phases. Thus, when you choose a site for your cat's bed, keep in mind his need for warmth and security. Look for a site that is high and protected. If his napping place is enclosed on at least three sides, he'll feel relaxed and secure. If the enclosure has a top, he'll feel even safer.

Observers have noted that the temperature

of the room determines the sleeping cat's body position. When the temperature is less than 55 degrees (not that common in our area), a cat usually curls up with his head tucked into his body. As the temperature increases, the cat's sleeping position opens up. At over 70 degrees, a cat usually lies uncurled with his paws out in front.

When a cat wakes, he usually takes a few minutes to stretch and restore his circulation. A yawn or two later, followed by a quick face wash, he's ready for action.

If you have a cat, chances are very good that you have a cat carrier to transport your cat. Consider also using the carrier for kitty's catnaps. If the carrier is padded with his favorite blanket, the familiar scent will help him to accept it, giving him plenty of opportunity to explore the cat taxi before you have to use it for transportation. Place it in a room where kitty likes to hang out, and remove the door, if possible. Put treats or favorite toys inside, and let him discover it on his own. Perhaps he will find the carrier suitable for his next catnap. A little work ahead of time will make the dreaded trip to your cat clinic easier, and may provide the perfect spot for a catnap!

Give your cat a hug... but don't wake him up!

Cat Etiquette For A New Year

Bathrooms

Always accompany guests to the bathroom. It is not necessary to do anything. Just sit and stare.

Doors

Do not allow any closed doors. To get a door open, stand on hind legs and hammer with forepaws... loudly. Once door is opened, it is not necessary to use it. After you have ordered an "outside" door opened, stand halfway in and out and think about several things. This is particularly important during rainy weather, or mosquito season.

Chairs and Rugs

If you have to throw up, get to a chair quickly. If you cannot manage in time, find the nearest rug. When throwing up on the carpet, make sure you back up so what you leave behind is as long as a human's bare foot.

Hampering

If one of your humans is engaged in some activity and the other is idle, stay with the busy one. This is called "helping," otherwise known as "hampering." Following are the rules for "hampering."

When supervising cooking, sit behind the left heel of the cook. You cannot be seen and thereby stand a better chance of being stepped on... and picked up and comforted.

For book readers, get in close, between the eyes and the book, unless you can lie across the book itself.

For paperwork, lie on the work in the most appropriate manner so as to obscure as much of the work as possible. Pretend to doze, but every so often reach out and slap the pencil or pen. Rolling around is also good.

When a human is holding the newspaper, be sure to

lunge for the back of the paper. Humans love to jump.

When your human is working at the computer, jump up on the desk, walk across the keyboard, bat the mouse, then lay in the human's lap, across the arms, hampering typing. It's best to do this while the human is typing, before they have time to do what they call "save," as it will get them really excited.

Walking

As often as possible, dart quickly, and as close as possible, in front of the human... especially on stairs, or when they have something in their arms. It also works well in the dark or when they first get up in the morning. This will help their coordination skills.

Bedtime

Always sleep on the human at night so he/she cannot move around.

Litterbox

When using the litter box, be sure to kick as much litter out of the box as possible. Humans love the feel of kitty litter between their toes.

Hiding

Every now and then, hide in a place where the humans cannot find you. Do not come out for three to four hours, under any circumstances. This will cause the humans to panic (which they love), thinking that you have run away or are lost. Once you do come out, the humans will cover you with love and kisses, and you will probably get a treat.

One Last Thought

Whenever possible, get close to a human, especially their face, turn around, and present the underside of your tail to them. Humans love this, so do it often. And don't forget the guests.



Nature Calls

Food: Basic To Life

One of most controversial topics in the veterinary industry is pet food. Food is the most basic element of good health. Yet food type is often the subject of dispute and varying opinions. It can be hard to decide what is right.

The truth is that veterinarians disagree on what is a nutritious diet for our animal companions. Some have suggested that animals eat what makes their owners happy. Others think sometimes animals seem to want a little variety. Still others, in a more traditional one-sizefits-all approach, recommend a commercial diet consisting of meat, meal, corn or other grains, meat by-products and fillers, stating that this diet is fed "successfully" to billions of animals on the planet.

How it Used to Be

Ancient dog diets are referred to for what to feed today, yet what did they eat? Dogs evolved around humans in ancient China, where they were feed what was left over, often meat scraps and a cheaper alternative — rice. Today wolves eat the weaker old and young animals consuming all of the parts including the stomach contents, which contain partially digested seeds and grasses.

It has only been since the 1950s that kibble was a source of pet food. Whole food was made into extruded pellets using meat, corn and animal by-products, and thus a cheap source of food was created. Still sold in the US, the agricultural and meat industry benefit from selling these products not used for human food.

In the multi-billion dollar commercial pet food industry food trials are routinely conducted. Food with chemical additives and musky, sprayed-on scents are popular with dogs.

Allergies and Food Sensitivity

When an animal is fed one thing for months or years, allergies and/or food sensitivities can develop. Like us, if our pets only eat chicken and corn every day for 10 years, over time the immune system may not handle this so well. Humans and dogs have a similar physiology although dogs have strong stomach acid and can digest some bones.

So variety, even within the same brand of food, is often helpful. Switching to another source of protein from time to time gives variety and lowers the risk of a reaction from the food.

Pesticides, GMOs and Antibiotics

Go organic. Many good reasons exist for buying organic food whenever possible. Commercial, processed foods use GMO corn, billions of pounds of chemical fertilizers, heavy pesticide spaying and meat raised on steroids and antibiotics.

No matter if you go raw, grain-free or cook for your animals... avoiding environmental toxins is crucial. Filtered water is the best choice for your animals too. As some say, if you don't filter, you are the filter.

Raw, Cooked or Kibble
Some animals like raw food
and some do not. Your local
holistic pet food store can
guide you to brands that are
flash frozen and tested for
pathogens like Salmonella,
which is the main risk with
these diets. It may be more
expensive to feed a raw diet.
Some people swear by them



grandchildren, Simon and Sadie.
"We have cats at home. I think Simon
(pre K) reads better when he comes to
read with the dogs."

But not just any dog can come. All wore green vests with gold embroidery saying they are certified pet therapy dogs. They have been trained to be great listeners.

The Suncoast Humane Society in Englewood, in conjunction with Pet Partners, a national organization, does a training course and evaluation that pets have to pass in order to certified.

Notice the use of the word "Pet." It is more than just dogs.

"Dos, cats, rabbits, llamas, pot-bellied pigs, we have a list of pets that can be accepted," said Claire Berten, director of resources and outreach services at Suncoast Humane Society.

"We offer this free to the community. We evaluate a team... that would be one pet, one handler... and we look at the animal closely since they will be representing the Suncoast Humane Society."

An online course offered through Pet Partners (there is a charge) is required (or take a course with an instructor, but none are nearby) as well as a face-to-face evaluation at the SuncoastHumane Society. Berten noted that pets have to be able to handle noise and visual activity. To know more, contact Berten by e-mail at: cberten@humane.org and visit www.petpartners.org.

If the team passes both the course and the evaluation, they are given the name of the embroidery company to order their green vests.

A number of libraries offer Read With the Dogs at different times (morning or afternoon). The libraries include Gulf Gate, Osprey, North Port, Jacaranda and Elsie Quirk. Check the individual library schedule at www.suncat.co.sarasota.fl.us.

And dogs that like interaction with people of different ages also go to nursing homes.

"All I have to do is say to Daisy 'do you want to go to work?,' said Danielle Jaeger who came with Daisy, a four-year old Pekingese. "We do all the libraries plus one nursing home. It is a prime time to be with the kids."

Every month Jennifer Propson brings her daughter Sophie to Read With the Dogs.

"We come to the library every month because she likes the dogs."

One dog owner could easily use her dog as a footstool. Boaco, a Leonberg-

er, came with Audrey Patterson. "He is very tuned into pet therapy. Loves seeing kids and having contact with kids."

Joanne Lize, retired librarian, founded the Read With the Dogs program. "I recently retired from Venice Library. For 12 years we did Read With the Dogs, partnering with Suncoast Humane Society."

Lize sat on the porch leading to the library, a large moose puppet in her hands as an "attractor" to get children and adults into the Osprey library, sometimes called 'the little library' as it is one large, light-filled room with many windows.

Erin Thayer, customer service representative at the Osprey Library looks forward to the

Wild Things



It's For The Birds

For those of you who live in Southwest Florida year round, you know that snowbird season is right around the corner. The roads are already beginning to fill up with out-of-state license plates, and although this may be somewhat of an inconvenience when you are trying to make it on time to work in the morning, comfort yourself knowing that they have a redeeming quality: the love of wildlife.

Every five years, the Association of Fishing and Wildlife Agencies (AFWA) collects data from each state to determine how many people participate in the following activities: hunting, fishing and wildlife-associated recreation. The survey includes both residential and non-residential participants, and thanks to our snowbirds, there are more visitors that come to Florida for wildlife recreation than any other state.

Snowbirds aren't the only ones that make their way south for the winter; Florida has documented over 500 species of native and migratory birds. The survey results from 2011 showed us that three million people organized a birding trip within the state or simply from their backyard. Bird watching makes up the largest population statistic within the category.

Birds appeal to all of our senses. From plumes changing to attract mates, to complex vocalizations spliced together to form a song, each and every species is unique. I am no ornithologist, but if you are bored with basic identification, try adding a layer to it. Challenge yourself. Ask and wonder why each bird has the special adaptations they do? Why is the beak shaped like that? Does their species' diet coincide with where I found

them? If not, then why would that be? I guarantee that connecting the dots will leave you with a feeling of self-confidence.

I have a confession to make: I used to be a skeptic. Why should I go bird watching? I am already outside a small chunk of my week, and the last thing I want to be doing is

identifying bird species especially if I already know most of them. Then it happened; my sister converted me. It has even gotten to the point where I now have favorites. The Roseate Spoonbill and Osprey are the chocolate chip cookies I wait to eat all day without the extra calories.

If you are considering giving this a try, do a little bit of research on the species of bird that you would like to observe before heading out. Think about the lifestyle of your bird. Is there a time of day where it is most active? This is especially important if it affects the availability of its food source. All wildlife spends the majority of its day foraging, so birds are no exception. Next, identify any specialized habitats that your bird needs. Much of Southwest Florida is surrounded by freshwater and saltwater. For example, a shorebird varies from a wading bird.

Save yourself from going on a "wild goose chase." Knowing the guirks of your birds ahead of time can make the difference between 10 sightings and no sightings. Join the masses that call themselves "birders." Besides being inexpensive, this activity doesn't require a wifi connection. It encourages families to get their children outside for a little sun exposure. It offers a way to teach the next generation other ways to appreciate the beauty of the natural environment. While on your adventures, if you happen to come across one of our feathered friends that appears to be distressed, you know who to call!

and their dogs and cats do great. Feeding refrigerated meat, which has more bacteria, is not recommended.

For proper nutrition, animals need bone meal and certain vitamins and minerals. We live in a hurricane state so feeding raw food is not always practical. Another option is to use part kibble with cooked food so you are covering the nutritional needs without feeding dry food day after day. Remember the movie Marley and Me? In some breeds dry food can create digestive problems like bloat. Dogs and cats teeth are not flat like ours; their teeth are made for shearing food and swallowing it whole. Food with moisture is better. When we say cooked food

we are not talking about pizza and your leftover pasta. More tips next time on how to cook food for your animals.
